Transaction Counting: Any Limits?

Transaction counting – adding up all those 10-28's, say – is a way to measure system usage. (Incidentally, abandoning ten-codes is no longer a NIMS requirement, according to DHS J). On a good day, the TIME System is running nearly 300K transactions. The FBI CJIS (NCIC) reports peak days at 7M transactions.

Here's my take on the persistent usage increase:

1. There are more devices connected to the network capable of initiating transactions. In the early 1980's, TIME had 300 terminals. Today we have 9,000.
2. More agencies and individual officers have access to TIME. We currently have 31,600 individuals registered in the TRAIN database. Dispatchers alone would never have been asked to shoulder the volume of transactions being run today.
3. By the late 1980's, we could run transactions on mobile terminals from squad cars. Today, portable and handheld equipment – combined with cellular technology and the Internet -- are moving access out to homes, streets, and sidewalks.
4. Run everything. Run everybody. There's almost no inhibition anymore about slowing down the system, or needing prior criminal predicate to justify a wide open search for stolen vehicles, revoked/expired registrations, fugitives, and terrorists.
5. Pre-fill electronic complaint forms. Why interview subjects and type in their addresses, when that data can (possibly) fill in the blanks automatically on a transaction response?
6. Run the license plate, and run the registered owner "just in case." Dates of birth on vehicle owners is a boon to law enforcement everywhere, and many states have added owner DOB's to their registration files.
7. Automatic license plate readers, speeding detection equipment, and red-light violation equipment are not big in Wisconsin yet, but coming. TIME transaction counts rise, nevertheless, because Wisconsin cars are driving into Mexico and Canada and being run (automatically) by Customs and Border Protection.
8. More information is being used for officer safety: protection orders, prior criminal history, terrorist files, immigration violators – to name a few. More federal law enforcement agencies than ever are looking at your criminal history and wanted person records.

System reliability and availability is high. Networks have excess bandwidth. New information services abound. Ok, maybe your MDC likes to go 10-42 just when you need it the most! But, I don't see an end in sight for growth in usage. The "global" information age is on our doorstep, and we have the tap in hand.

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NCIC Audit Results

NCIC audited 9 local agencies and CIB in May 2006. The NCIC audit assesses policy compliance and the effectiveness of system operations within the state. The audit assessment includes a review of the security of terminals, accuracy, completeness and validity of record entries, the use of criminal history record information, and the training status of system users.

NCIC staff reviewed a total of 846 records at the local agencies and found:

- A 0.65% error rate in the Wanted Persons File (national average 2.59%)
- A 14.98% error rate in the Missing Persons File (national average 10.86%)
- A 3.18% error rate in the Vehicle File (national error 1.98% national)
- A 15.55% error rate in the Protection Order/Injunction File (no national error rate was available)

The NCIC audit also identified several areas of concern which became evident during their record review. These included:

- Agencies not performing required second-party checks. Such checks could have found and corrected many of the errors found.
- Agencies not properly validating records. This included agencies failing to compare the record with case file information, failing to update records with new or additional information, and agencies failing to re-contact the original complainant to determine if the person is still wanted, missing, or if the property in question has been recovered.
- Unauthorized or improper use of III. Agencies had improperly queried III for firefighter applicants, a housing authority, and for personal reasons.
- Incorrect use of purpose codes in III. Agencies failed to use purpose code F, and showed confusion about the different uses of purpose codes C and J.
- Improper use of the Attention line for III. The Attention line must specifically identify the recipient of the information; agencies were only including generic identifiers such as 'jail' or 'dispatch'.
- Agencies not using strong passwords
- Expired or no TIME System certification. Nearly 23% of system users held expired certifications. Just over 6% required initial certification.
- Background checks of all personnel, including information technologies staff.
- Security awareness training was not provided to information technologies staff.
- Timely entry/removal of records. NCIC audit staff found numerous records that were no longer valid but remained in the system, including a warrant that had been dismissed 10 years prior, vehicles that had been recovered 2 years prior to the audit date, and missing persons that had returned 4 years prior.
- Encryption standards not being met.

Agencies should take steps to review these areas within their department to ensure proper actions are being taken.

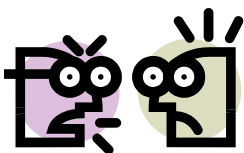
Interface Plans: What Are They, Who Needs Them and When?

While many agencies access the TIME System using the Portal 100 or Enforcer software, just as many agencies access the system in another way. Agencies may have computer aided dispatch software that automatically queries any license plate typed into a call record. Agencies may use mobile data computers to access the TIME System. An agency may have contracted with an outside vendor to write software that allows them to query the TIME System in a way they specify. However this access is accomplished, these agencies are considered 'interface agencies' with regards to the TIME System.

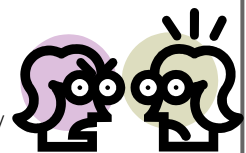
Because such systems are connected to the TIME System, any agency who is upgrading or obtaining an interface to the TIME System must complete an interface plan and the plan must be reviewed and approved by CIB. There are numerous technical security requirements, network configuration questions, and other concerns that must be addressed before an agency will be allowed to go forward with connecting to the TIME System.

Agencies may request the Computer Interface Plan document from Chris Kalina, TIME System Operations Coordinator, (608) 266-7394, E-mail: kalinaca@doj.state.wi.us. Agencies should read the documentation and complete the document. A private vendor cannot notify CIB of a new or upgraded interface; such notification must be made by the involved law enforcement/criminal justice agency. Upon receipt of a completed Interface Plan, CIB will analyze the information and contact the submitting agency to set up a meeting in Madison to discuss the plan and other issues affecting interface agencies. Prior to becoming an active interface, an agency will be required to sign an agreement with DOJ acknowledging its administrative and operational responsibilities. A computer interface agency must achieve and consistently maintain the minimum technical specifications and policy requirements as established by the CIB, NLETS, and NCIC.

When contracting for a new or upgraded interface, agencies are encouraged to contact CIB in advance to ensure they understand what technical and other security requirements must be met so these items can be included in the request for bids and/or contract. Agencies are also strongly urged to contact CIB and complete an interface plan early in the process. Due to the complex issues involved, and the workload of the technical security experts here at CIB, approval of an interface plan takes time, thus, for example, submitting the required plan 2 days before the interface is scheduled to be up and running is problematic and may cause a delay in your installation.



POIF & Hit Confirmation



Did you know you could do hit confirmation on a protection order/injunction file (POIF) record? At the end of 2006, there were over 15,000 POIF records in the CIB database, yet during the course of 2006 only 56 hit confirmation requests were done on POIF records. That means that less than 1/2 of 1% of POIF entries were confirmed.

Over 9,000 of these orders were domestic abuse orders. Statistics show that 60-69% of all domestic abuse orders/injunctions are violated by the respondent. Agencies are reminded that performing hit confirmation on a POIF record can provide valuable information to officers investigating domestic abuse and other complaints, and may even provide probable cause to make an arrest for a violation of the order.



Criminal History Purpose Codes

Recent audits have identified the need to review and clarify the correct use of criminal history purpose codes.

Code C: Criminal Justice/Law Enforcement - Accepted by III and CIB. Adult and juvenile records supplied. This code is used for official duties in connection with administration of criminal justice, and may also be used in situations that are not part of a criminal justice investigation when needed to maintain the security of the criminal justice facility, for example, checks on vendors or contractors at the criminal justice agency who are *not* involved with the actual administration of criminal justice at the criminal justice agency (janitors, cooks, etc); volunteers at the criminal justice agency who are *not* involved with the actual administration of criminal justice (participants in community ride along programs, etc), jail/prison visitors, inmates, a prisoner's list of names and addresses of those wishing to correspond with the prisoner when there is reason to believe that criminal activity is occurring or has occurred.

Code D: Civil Domestic Violence & Stalking Cases - Accepted by III and CIB. CIB will return only adult records, III will return information that has not been sealed by the contributing state. This code is used for civil court cases involving domestic violence or stalking (civil courts are issued a NCIC Agency Identifier).

Code F: Return of Firearms to Lawful Owner - Accepted by III and CIB. Adult and juvenile records supplied. Code F is used by criminal justice agencies in possession of firearms that have been stolen, confiscated, or used in suicides who are concerned that in returning them to their lawful owner the agency may be providing firearms to persons who are prohibited by law from possession of firearms. This code may also be used in cases where the firearm is pawned.

Code H: Public Housing Applicants - Accepted by III and CIB. CIB returns only adult records, III returns an identification response only. This code is used to check the suitability of applicants for public housing under the authority of applicable laws. The public housing authority must submit a fingerprint card to the FBI to obtain the complete record. A fee will be assessed.

Code J: Criminal Justice Employee Applicants - Accepted by III and CIB. Adult and juvenile records returned. This purpose code is used to initiate background checks of law enforcement/criminal justice agency personnel/applicants. This includes vendors/contractors who *are* involved with the actual administration of criminal justice at the criminal justice agency (personnel involved with maintenance of computer systems, etc) and volunteers who *are* involved with the actual administration of criminal justice at the agency.

Code E: Civil Employment or Licensing Purposes - Accepted by **CIB only**, no other purpose code may be used to bypass this requirement and access III information for employment purposes. Only adult records will be returned. Authorized means that the criminal history inquiry is required by state statute, local ordinance or federal regulation. A fee will be assessed. Agencies using this code on TIME terminals are encouraged to use <http://wi-recordcheck.org> instead.

Updates to Hazardous Materials Caveats

Users may notice a change in the caveats or warnings that appear on a hazardous materials entry in the article file. NCIC has added the following informational message to such records: FOR MORE INFORMATION CONTACT NLETS HAZMAT, CHEMTREC OR THE DOT. In addition, the record warnings will reflect the type of hazardous material entered, for example, a record may contain the warning DANGER – POTENTIAL EXPLOSION OR FIRE HAZARD or DANGER – CORROSIVE SUBSTANCE – AVOID SKIN CONTACT – CAN BURN OR DISFIGURE.



Entry of 'Unknown' License Plates

TIME System users should be aware that some state motor vehicle departments have issued license plate numbers UNK, UNKN, and UNKNOWN. Previously NCIC did not allow these values in the LIC field.

Effective immediately, these values may be entered in the LIC field, but only by staff of the Criminal Justice Information Services (CJIS) Section of NCIC. Contact CJIS by administrative message (ORI DCFBIWA09) or via email (acjis@leo.gov) for entry of this information into the Vehicle File, License Plate File, or any person file. Because this info is entered by NCIC CJIS, the information will appear in the NCIC record only and will not appear in the CIB record.



PSN Request Form

Agencies are reminded that when they need to request additional physical station numbers (PSNs) for new TIME System terminals, they should complete the PSN Request Form. This form is located on the CIB website at www.doj.state.wi.us/dles/cib/forms. The form allows an agency to provide all the information CIB will need to establish/assign a PSN, such as level of access, IP addressing information, assignment of broadcast groups, etc. Providing all the information requested on the form will allow CIB to process your request faster, without having to re-contact an agency to obtain information on missing items.

E-Mail & TIME System Information

A TIME System user recently posed the following question to CIB: Is it a violation of policy to e-mail TIME System information to an officer?

Whether or not e-mailing TIME System information is a policy violation depends on what information is being transmitted over the Internet. The CJIS Security Policy requires advanced authentication (such as a biometric system, smart card, token, etc.), a minimum of 128 bit encryption, and the encryption in place must meet the FIPS 140-2 encryption certification standard. Agencies must meet the CJIS Security Policy for transmitting CJIS data (III and NCIC responses) over the Internet. Other TIME System data may be transmitted over the Internet to authorized recipients under the same guidelines and restrictions applied to faxing TIME System data.



NCIC \$ N & M Messages

Advisory messages sent by NCIC all begin with a standard character, the dollar sign (\$). When you see a message beginning with a dollar sign this is an indication the message has been generated by NCIC. The dollar sign is then followed with a letter of the alphabet used to indicate what type of message is being sent.



Whenever an entry or modification is made to the missing persons file or unidentified persons file, the entry is automatically compared to the opposite file to determine if there is a possible match: Is the person listed as missing possibly listed as an unidentified person or vice versa?

The result of this comparison search is sent to the agency that made the entry/modification. These messages can serve as valuable leads for the agency, and may assist the agency in recovering a body or solving a missing person case. If the comparison between the missing and unidentified person files does not find a possible match, a \$N No Match message is sent to the agency holding the entry. If the comparison between the missing and unidentified person files *does* find a possible match, a \$M message is sent to all agencies involved.

NCIC \$N & \$M messages have a new format. The format includes a literal translation of what type of message is being sent so users may more easily identify the information.

Advanced Training Available Online

CIB is pleased to announce that Advanced TIME System training is now available online via CIB's TRAIN website.



TIME System Advanced training is designed for personnel who have successfully attained Basic TIME System certification and will perform entry, modify, supplemental and cancel transactions.

Advanced classroom instruction consists of a 2 day session. Advanced online training consists of 3 instructional modules:

1. Enter Person Records
2. Enter Vehicle Records (which includes license plates and parts)
3. Enter Other Property Records

Advanced TIME System certification students must also complete an 'at your agency' project. For online students, project information is contained in a separate 'Advanced Project' module. Users must complete the three entry modules before they can be registered for the project module.

Advanced project modules are now available for registration on TRAIN in the advanced category, online subcategory.

NICB *Lean* Lien Holder Data Returns

Late last year the National Insurance Crime Bureau (NICB) advised that they were no longer able to return lien holder data on vehicles queried through their database. Lien holder information is once again available, but the data is returned in a separate, second response. This second response will not only include lien holder data, but also eBay auction response information and data from the Mexican OCRA database (Mexico's version of NICB).

Portal Pointers

As use of the Portal 100 software to access the TIME System becomes more widespread, CIB will occasionally offer hints/pointers about the software that may answer some user questions or resolve reported issues. A new pointer:



PPP-Partial Printing Possible – Have you ever hit the ‘Print Message’ button in the Portal 100 ‘Auto’ view window? If so, you soon found out this caused all messages received since logging on to print. When using the ‘Auto’ view of the Portal 100 software it is possible to highlight just one message or a portion of a message and print just the highlighted text. Once you have highlighted the desired text, click the right button on your mouse. A short menu will appear, choose the ‘Print’ option. This will bring up the print dialog box. Select your desired printer, and in the ‘Page Range’ section of the box select ‘Selection’. Now click print and only the text you highlighted will print – saving paper, saving trees, and saving frustration!
